The wise one to the cosmic age

Although more than 90 years old, in his school in the south of India, *Kavi Yogi Maharishi* (great divine visionary, wise poet), Dr. Shuddhananda Bharati worked like a young man of twenty.

When he was asked his age, he answered: "My age is Courage!"

The Yogi wrote several hundred works in English, French, Tamil, Hindi, Telugu and Sanskrit; five thousand songs, and fifteen hundred poems in French. The magnum opus of the man conscious of the presence of God in him, *Bharata Shakti*, (in 50,000 verses) described his ideal: only One Humanity living in communion with only One God in a transformed world! *Bharata Shakti* is a monumental and unique work. The Yogi depicts the gasoline of all the religions, of all the prophets and saints, all the

approaches of *Yoga* and all the cultures on an allegorical fabric. It is a book for any age which all spiritual researchers and all nations should read and meditate on. This work was completed and appreciated by Sri Aurobindo, the Mother, Mahatma Gandhi, Rabindranath Tagore, Romain Rolland, Annie Besant, Bertrand Russell, George Bernard Shaw, Dr. Suzuki and so many others. It installs the author among the great, men such as Dante, Homer, Racine, Shakespeare, Vyasa, and Valmiki.


Dr. Shuddhananda Bharati is the greatest Tamil poet, having translated into this language: *Gita, Upanishads, Veda,* the *Bible,* the *Koran, Avesta,* the *Buddha-Dhamma-Sangha* and *Tattvartha Sutra,* the life and teachings of Lao-Tseu and Confucius. From their original languages, he also translated into Tamil *The Divine Comedy* of Dante, the tragedies of Racine, the comedies of Molière, the dramas of Corneille, Shakespeare, Goethe and the novels of Anatole France, Victor Hugo, Alexandre Dumas and others.

Shuddhananda's works are innumerable. Malcolm Macdonald, who chaired the Congress on the Unity of the Conscience in Singapore, said in his short speech about him: "He is such a remarkable man, having such a diversity of raised gifts, that it is difficult to know where to start and where to finish when one speaks about Kavi Yogi Dr. Shuddhananda Bharati. Few men have achieved as many things in only one human life."

His name appears moreover in the Encyclopaedia of the World's Great Men, which says: "Dr. Shuddhananda Bharati is the author of literary works of varied styles: works epic and lyric, melodramas, operas, comedies, pastoral, romance, novels, biographies, commentaries on famous works and texts. *Bharata Shakti* is his magnum opus." He had a presentiment that he would receive the Nobel Prize for Peace or for Literature but did not live to see it. His commitment is summarized in his book celebrating his life, "Experiences of a Pilgrim Soul (Expériences d'une Âme de Pèlerin)."

I. Ancient history (Sangam)

Tamil is an exemplary language, an ancient language and one of the most beautiful languages; it is at the root of many languages. It was the Tamil Sangam of Madurai that was responsible for the growth of the Tamil language. Three Sangams nurtured Tamil:

1) First Sangam:

It had 549 poets and learned men including Aran, Agathiar, Murugavel and Mudirayar as members. Eighty-nine kings from Kaisinavazhudhi to Kodungon were patrons of Tamil during this period. Contributing books such as *Paripadal Mudhunaarai*, *Mudhukurugu* and *Kalariyavarai*, the first Sangam flourished for 4440 years before it was sadly swallowed up by the sea!

2) Middle Sangam:

The middle Sangam was born in Kapaadapuram. Patronised by 59 learned men including Agathiar, Tolkappiar and Keerandhaiyar, 59 kings and 3700 poets who contributed their songs, it flourished for 3700 years; it contributed books such as *Agathiyam*, *Tolkappiam*, *Mapuranam*, *Isai Nunukkam* (Nuances of music) and *Boodhapuranam*. The sea of arts that was Kapaadapuram was also swallowed up by the waves of the sea. Probably the sea had a thirst for Tamil! Only *Tolkappiam* was salvaged.

3) Last Sangam:

The last Sangam was formed in present-day Madurai. It was patronised by 49 kings from Mudathirumaran to Ugraperuvazhudhi. The last Sangam period was illumined by the presence of 49 learned men such as Sendham Boodhanar, Ilanthirumaran, Arivudaiyanar, Perunkunroorkizhar, writer Nallanthuvanar, Naaganaar, Nakeeranar and Paranaar. Songs were contributed by 446 persons in the Sangam. Poets prospered during this time. Contributing several books such as Nedunthogai Nanooru, Nattrinai Nanooru, Ainkurunooru, Padhitrupattu, Kalithogai 150, Pari-

padal 70, Koothuvari, Perisai and Chithrisai, it flourished for 1950 years in north Madurai. So, the Tamil language in the Sangam flourished and developed over a period of 10000 years. Books on drama such as Gunanool, Koothunool, Bharatham, Sayandham, Muruval etc, books on painting, Kanaanool, a musical treatise called Pancha Bharatiyam, books on reasoning, Taralanool and others were all swept away by the whirlwind of time. What was left? A small part of Agathiyam, Tolkappiam, Patthupattu, Ettuthogai, Padhinenkeezhkanakku, Avvai Arunthamizh. Innumerable trees in the beautiful garden of Tamil withered away. Let us wander under the cool shade of the remaining trees. Let us now look to nurture Tamil to preserve these treasures of the world.

Agathiar's *Agathiyam* was eroded by the white ants of time and was distorted. Tolkappiar who had acquired great knowledge from Agathiar devised the Tamil grammar including letter, words and meaning. *Tolkappiam with essays* contributed by great persons such as

Senavaraiyar Ilam Pooranar, Kallaadar and Nacchinaarkiniyar exists; many small grammar books have been created with its help. Some learned men had knowledge of letters, words, and knew love as a mental experienceonly to help them in objective themes such as war and statecraft etc, deceit, chastity, conviction, comparison. In those days books on music and dance appeared and disappeared.

The collection of *Patthupattu* (ten compositions) shines with an ever-youthful beauty. These compositions namely *Thirumurugatrupadai*, *Ponnaratrupadai*, *Sirupanatrupadai*, *Mullaipattu*, *Pattinapalai* and *Malaipadu Kadaam* are the ten gems adorning the crown of the Tamil Mother.

The greatness of Muruga, the prosperity of Tamil Nadu, the earth's resources, the characteristics of the season of chill winds covering the months of Aippasi and Karthikai, the beauty of Madurai, the good karma of kings such as Karkaar Peruvalavan and Nedunchezhiyan, the norms of domestic life, the greatness of chastity, the

qualities of the earth, mother, God, atheism and Ori – these form the subject matter of *Patthupattu*.

Ettuthogai is the garland of victory of the Tamil Mother. The Ettuthogai books Nattinai, Kurunthogai, Ainkurunooru, Padhitrupattu, Paripadal, Kalithogai, Aganabooru and Purananooru have been written by several learned men. The qualities of the three Tamil kings, wealth, the valour and skills of the Tamil Maravars, the charitable acts of the wealthy, people's ethics and ability, history of Tamil kings, the greatness of Tamil Nadu – these aspects are dealt with in the Ettuthogai books. These books depict the knowledge, compassion, grace, opinions and hospitality of the Tamil people of those times.

Padhinenkeezhkanakku is a treasure trove of morality; it is an exposition on ethics, wealth, happiness and home. Naaladiyar, Naanmanikadikai, Inna Narpadhu, Iniyavai Narpadhu, Kaarnarpadhu, Kalavazhi Narpadhu, Aindhinai Aimbathu, Aindhinai Ezhupadhu, Thinaimozhi Aimbathu, Thinaimalai

Nootruaimbathu, Thirikadukam, listing of scriptural observances, proverbs, Sirupanchamoolam (a didactic poem), Mudhumozhi Kanchi, Eladhi (a diactic work), Kainilai and Tirukkural - it is a victory sceptre of the compilation of eighteen books. Valluvar Nayanar's Tirukkural alone is the universal book. See my book Tirukkural Couplets. Written in a metrical foot of three metrical syllables typical of 'venba' verse, these explain the principles of an ethical life clearly. Read my book Tirukuralinbam. People of all religions - Saivites, Vaishnavites, Jains, Buddhists, Muslims and Christians - contributed to the growth of the Tamil language.

Between the years 100 to 600 A.D. five big epic works were composed, namely Seevagachintamani, Silappadikaram, Manimekalai, Valayapathi and Kundalakesi. In Valayapathi and Kundalakesi only some scattered songs are available. I have done research on both and written Valayapathi Agaval and Kundalakesi Agaval in verse and also staged both of them as plays. I have included both in the epic Bharata Shakti. I have anal-

ysed the finer aspects of those epic poems with Jeevagan in the play *Kama Tilakan* and in *Silambu Selvam* and *Manimekalaia-mudam*.

Silappadikaram is a book based on the Tamil people's culture that explains the excellence of the Cherans, Cholas and Pandyas, the sublimity of Kannagi's chastity and the good and just rule of the Pandyas. Its verses, beauty, elaboration and subject matter are written with a captivating, sweet style.

We can savour the beauty and structure of Poompugar, the power of Kannagi's chastity, the just rule of the Tamil kings, the ethical domestic life of the people and noble duties of ascetics, the ambrosial nature of *Manimekalai*, the poetic ability of the poets and the liberality of the kings in the five epic compositions.

Our gratitude and salutations to Professor U. V. Swaminathan who researched and presented us with these literary works of the Sangam period with strenuous effort!

After the Sangam period, the Tamil political scenario deteriorated. Poetry was afflicted by poverty.

After Tiruvalluvar, some people such as Adhigamaan, Kapilar, Avvaiyar, Karaikal Ammaiyar, Tirumoolar, Idaikaadar and Kallaadar appeared on the scene and demonstrated their powers of divine yoga. Some revered poets such as Angavai, Sangavai, Boodhapandiyan Devi, Nappasalaiyar, Nanmullaiyar, Gandhiyar, Kamakanniyar, Velliveedhiyar, Keerandhaiyar, Masaathiyar and Naagaiyar were also prominent at that time.

Buddhism and Jainism flourished in Tamil Nadu for innumerable years and they blended with our arts. Koolavanigasaathanar praises the Buddhist religion in his *Manimekalai*; making compassion for life flow from the lips of *Manimekalai*, he provides an inexhaustible feast of literary food. Ilango was a Jain ascetic. He has bequeathed his *Silappadikaram* that is an epic poem of prose, music and drama as artistic wealth to us. All the religions of

those times such as Saivism, Vaishnavites, Buddhism and Jainism are included in it.

Tiruthakkadevar's Seevagachintamani is an epic poem that is wholly Jain in nature. Seevagachintamani marries multiple times, becomes acquainted with the nature of the world and becomes an ascetic. Great poetic compositions such as Nariviruttham, Perunkadhai, Neelakesi, Soolamani, Udhayanankaadhai and Merumandiram spoke movingly about the mores of Jainism.

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
